Members design projects for elderly residents that provide sensory stimulation and a sense of accomplishment.

Past and future events include:

- ⇒ Pussy willow painting and flower arranging with daffodils and tulips
- ⇒ Planting a small, indoor fairy garden
- ⇒ Building bird nesting material holders from grape vines and filling with alpaca wool
- ⇒ With colored sand, creating a design in a glass planter to hold a succulent
- ⇒ Arranging flowers collected from members' gardens in vases, baskets, or pumpkins, depending on season or upcoming holiday
- ⇒ Singing, talking, hugging and generally spending time with a group of wonderful, entertaining people to brighten their day
